#### **Vocational Studies Update**

Well over 100 students in Years 12 and 13 sat external examination papers this January for the Level 3 Btec courses. For some of our students this was problem solving using practical database software, activity plans, as well as the 'traditional' examination approaches.

We are pleased to report that our students achieved 99% D-P. Students'scores in these components will be added to their totals so far, - early indications look like it will be a bumper year of success. Specific subject highlights include; Applied Psychology, where 3 students achieved a distinction, 4 students in Health and Social Care and 5 students in ICT. This sets them up with the ability to gain D\* when the grades are released on August 15<sup>th</sup>.

Our Year 12 learners have made a tremendous start to their courses. 100% Distinction to Pass on the first external assessments.

In other news, our Year 11 students submitted controlled assessment work in Child Development, Digital Information Technology, Engineering, Health and Social Care, Music and Sport. We are so proud of what they have achieved so far as it seems such a long time ago since these were submitted. 22 of our learners gained a Level 2 Distinction for their efforts. A special mention goes to Bethany Carr, Isla Groom, Zoe Wildon, Hannah Elliott, Evie Locksmith, Leah Phelan, Mia Ravenhill-Brown, Harrison Arch, Jake Dunnett, Daniel Flewitt, Sam Read, Lauren Hammond, who have scored Distinctions in all their submissions so far.

Finally, our Year 10 cohort of learners are at the halfway point in their current controlled assessments – we thank all our parents and carers for their support in this. The scores after the teachers have marked them have to be with the exam board in early May, so please, if you miss a session through illness, speak to your teachers to ensure that you complete all the tasks and get marks that will help you build towards success in Year 11. This controlled assessment contributes 30% of the final grade.

# Year 7 History

In the History Department we want students to learn about the past and in Key Stage 3 we try to cover as much history as possible in the lesson a week Years 7-9 have with us. More important than the facts they learn though, are the skills we try to teach them, which will not only help them at GCSE and A Level but will provide important life skills in whatever career they choose. Writing a coherent argument to persuade the reader of their opinion is what essays are all about in History. We want our students to be able to select and deploy evidence to support their argument and to have the ability to organise their ideas in a logical and convincing way. We teach them to mine sources (pieces of text, images, objects) for information, evaluate that evidence for its reliability and usefulness, and then to deploy that knowledge to inform their opinions of past events. In this 'information age' these skills are vital to help students navigate the internet, become critical thinkers and be sceptical readers of the news.

I thought parents and carers might like to see what our Year 7 students are capable of in terms of the skills I have just outlined, so here is an extraordinarily good essay written by a student in Year 7 this term, under timed conditions. It was an absolute pleasure to mark!

Here is an extract of an essay on the Battle of Hastings by Year 7 student Rebecca Elmy:

In the battle of Hastings luck was a very important factor and it helped the Normans win the fight. The fact that Harold was shot in the eye, when his troops were at their weakest, was very lucky as William's troops couldn't actually see who they were shooting up at as they were lower than them. As William had to travel by boat the wind was a very significant factor, when William and his troops tried to set off earlier the winds were going in the wrong direction that they needed to, this meant that William couldn't get his out to sea so they had to wait. In my opinion this was lucky in some ways as Harold was in the south, where William would come, ready to attack but because of the wind, it instead helped the Vikings get across in the north so Harold had to leave go fight them instead. This also lead to when William actually got to England, some of Harold's army had already been killed and all of Harold's army were tired.




#### Design & Technology Elective

#### **BT Hothouse**

In January, the whole of Year 12 were invited to spend a day at Adastral Park's Hothouse for an insight into a pressurised working environment. Hosted by Adam and Tom, who run Hothouse events for BT and other large corporations, the event posed questions to students who then had access to resources such as high-tech office areas, theatres and robots to research answers to their chosen topic.

The questions were designed by some selected students in advance of the event, and whilst all questions were technology focused, they ranged from how technology could be used in war to reduce casualties to how it could be used for improving the quality of life for the disabled community. To assist the research undertaken online, each group nominated two students to tour the BT Showcase which has some exciting new technologies that are being developed, to see how they could be applied to their chosen research question.

Once teams had completed their research, they had to deliver a presentation to all the other students. It was great to see the range of directions groups took for their research and the presentations they produced.

Personally, I found this day improved my teamwork, researching skills and presenting skills as well as providing me with an experience of a professional, high intensity situation. Thank you, Adam and Tom, for the opportunities that the day provided.







# High Voltage

On Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> February, High Voltage Dance Company got to perform the culmination of 6 months worth of work as part of the Sadler's Wells Making Moves project.

Making Moves is a new choreography and performance project for schools and youth groups across England, run by Sadler's Wells and supported by Barclays. Connecting young people with the ideas of some of the world's most exciting choreographers, Making Moves aims to raise the profile of dance being created in school and youth settings, and offers a chance to perform on one of Sadler's Wells stages.

Running across the academic year starting in September 2023, Making Moves provided all 50 participating groups with digital choreographic toolkits created by four professional dance artists connected with Sadler's Wells. The toolkits are designed to inspire ideas for generating movement and contain a wealth of supporting resources. Kesgrave were lucky enough to be paired with Dannielle "Rhimes" Lecointe.

The project began with a training weekend at Sadler's Wells for group leaders, which Mr Ashworth attended, including masterclasses led by the choreographers. High Voltage then had to draw from the toolkits and work with to create a new dance work, which was performed in the Thomas Theatre at KHS and at our regional venue, Dance East.



Following the regional performances which end in April, 8 groups from across the country will be invited to perform on Sadler's Wells stage in July 2024, to a public audience and a panel of professionals from the dance sector. One group will be given an award for Best New Choreography.

High Voltage did a brilliant job at representing Kesgrave as part of a national project and showcased the range of talent we have at the school.

#### Year 13 London History Trip

Both Year 13 history classes attended a trip to London to complement their learning on Lancastrians, Yorkists and Tudors (1399–1509).

We visited Westminster Abbey first, and looked at memorials to political and literary figures such as Winston Churchill, Franklin Roosevelt, Geoffrey Chaucer, W. H Auden, C. S Lewis and more. Additionally, we were able to visit the tombs of many of the kings mentioned on our course such as Henry V, Richard II and Henry VII, as well as those not on our course, like Edward the Confessor. Also, we visited the tombs of famed female historical figures, such as Elizabeth of York and Margaret Beaufort.

We then visited the National Portrait Gallery, allowing us to look at portraits of monarchs such as Richard III, Elizabeth I and Henry VIII, before visiting the Tower of London, allowing us to see the Crown Jewels and the Royal Armoury.

This trip was very helpful for helping us to consolidate our knowledge of the course, and gain some additional knowledge we didn't yet know. A big thank you to Mrs Bernstein and Mrs Wakeley for taking us!




# Textiles Craft Club

#### Year 13 EPQ


A huge congratulations to our Year 13 students who have just completed their EPQ (Extended project Qualification). EPQ is an A-level standard standalone qualification designed to extend and develop students' abilities beyond the A-level syllabus and prepare for university or their future career. Students have been working hard throughout year 12 and 13 to produce a project which is of interest to them. The process has involved many research skills such as, finding sources to support their research question, the process of referencing, formulating a research question. Many students have taken this further by conducting their own primary research.


At the beginning of March 2024 students presented their research findings to other students, staff, and governors. All students presented to a very high standard, the confidence and passion demonstrated by students was very impressive. Many students explained that their project has helped them in deciding their future career / study options. Olvia, one of our year13 EPQ students has expressed that her research into social services has been very beneficial to her in her application process to become a social worker which she has been successful on securing a place on. Many students have also been able to raise an incredible amount of awareness into certain disorders such as FASD (Fetal alcohol spectrum disorders). Please see below the EPQ title's students have researched:

- To what extent is social workers mental health supported?
- To what extend has the gender of female monarchs affected their ability to rule?
- What evidence is there that the Sugar Tax will have a positive effect on the dental health of the UK juvenile population in the next twenty years?
- Does the UK prison system in our contemporary society have more negative effects on offenders and society as opposed to positive effects?
- Why has there been a decrease of women in the computer science industry in the UK?
- To what extent has the media impacted Dr Swift's feminist ideologies in her 1989, Reputation and Lover Albums.
- How can teachers be helped to understand FASD?
- Is genetic engineering a variable practice for the future?
- Modelling real-life scenarios

Again, a massive well done and congratulations to these year 13 students who have successfully completed and handed in their projects. We look forward to seeing the research outcomes of our current year 12 EPQ students.
