

They have used the garden to teach the students about weeding, planting, taking cuttings and suchlike. Many students have started to enjoy the space that is provided, and I know many more will for years to come. We have, in recent weeks, implemented a plot for herbs and leaves and now are proud that our lettuces have come to fruition ready for consumption.

## German Exchange

It is with great pleasure that the MFL Department have been able to set up the German exchange once again, following a 3-year pause due to COVID, and in all honesty I think it is the best one we have ever done!

11 students from Year 10, 11 and 12 took part in the exchange in conjunction with Farlingaye High School.

Partners were paired earlier in the year and began to make contact with one another. Then, in June, the German exchange pupils came to us for a week and had a wonderful programme of activities. This started with a day at Kesgrave, attending registration, going to lessons and being with their partners for lunch and break. Pupils were given a tour of the school by our Year 12 German students (thanks to Abbey, Aidan, Ethan, Oliwia and Oscar) and had cake with Miss Upton. So impressed were they by the school, that they actually requested to be in school again the next afternoon instead of having a full day in Woodbridge!

Pupils also visited Bury St Edmunds, Aldeburgh, Southwold and Cambridge with their teachers. At the weekend, students spent time with their English host families. Some were lucky enough to go sightseeing in London whilst others had imprompt ubarbeques and gettogethers, including a glorious Sunday at the beach in Felixstowe. The German students were very upset to be going home with one student telling their teacher "the only thing I want is to stay in England!" Many parents also spoke to me about how much they had enjoyed hosting a student, with one parent going as far as to call it a "life-affirming experience".





## German Exchange

A week later it was our turn to return to Germany. We too got to spend a day in the German school where many bleary-eyed students were shocked by the 8am start but loved the 1pm finish! We also went to an outdoor village of German life and to the Rhön area where we enjoyed summer toboggan rides. A tour of Würzburg, a visit to the UNESCO World Heritage Residenz, a reception at the town hall and a trip to the beautiful town of Bamberg were also on the programme. At the weekend pupils all did something exciting with their host families; there were late night visits to the observatory, barbecues, trips to the Kiliani festival, road trips to Nuremberg and Frankfurt, plus boat trips and cooling off in the outdoor swimming pool. Tears were shed when we had to leave and some pupils already have arrangements for return visits. Memories have been made that will last a lifetime and some friendships will hopefully go the same way.

As a German teacher, there is nothing better than to finally hear pupils using the language that they have learned in the classroom in an authentic environment. As one boy said: "this is what I have waited five years for!"

In September we will begin the process of recruiting partners to our next exchange and I hope that many take the opportunity to experience it themselves. All who went on the exchange this year would certainly testify to it being an amazing experience.



### KHS Interns

Four ex-Kesgrave students were invited to come back to work with the Sixth Form Team as Interns for three weeks in July. They were invited to do this as they achieved exceptional A Level grades and have gone on to study English Literature, Law and Medicine at university. They have given one to one lessons to students who needed subject specific support and have stretched and challenged those students who are aiming to achieve the highest grades. They have also given talks on how to make a successful application to Oxbridge, supported students writing their personal statement for UCAS and have run practice interviews for Medicine and Dentistry. This has been an exciting new programme that we hope to continue next year so that more students can benefit from our Sixth Form high achievers.

### Year 13 History Trip

Have you ever wondered why you see elephant-shaped street signs on the streets of Colchester? It's not because of the zoo but because the Roman Emperor, Claudius, rode into Colchester on an elephant in AD43! It must have been quite a terrifying sight for the tribal people of the area! This was the crowning glory moment of Claudius' plan to conquer Britain and make it into a Roman province. Why did he come to Colchester? He came because it had become the most important settlement of the most powerful of the British tribes, the Catuvellauni (who had taken it from the local Trinovantes tribe). For Claudius, it was the key place to capture in order to demonstrate Roman power and to form a base from which to create a province.

We followed in the footsteps of Claudius and made our own invasion of Camulodunum – heading for Colchester Castle which is built on the foundations of the massive Temple of Claudius, another powerful symbol of Roman dominion. Only the foundations of it remain and we enjoyed a tour of these. The guide told us that Colchester Castle is the largest British keep castle because it was built directly onto the foundations of the temple. Inside the museum there are many Roman artefacts. We saw tombstones of some of the very first Roman soldiers to live in Camulodunum, which became a Roman colony for retired soldiers in AD49, making Colchester the oldest official city in Britain! There is also evidence of the destruction caused by Boudicca and her huge throng of British rebels who attacked Camulodunum in AD60, burning it to the ground and killing all the inhabitants who had taken shelter in the Temple of Claudius.

We also enjoyed a visit to the Balkerne Gate which was the main gateway built into the walls that were constructed after the Boudiccan rebellion and finally a tour of the roof top of the castle with commanding views across Colchester. In Roman times, this view would have included a massive chariot racing track to the south – the only one to have been discovered in Britain.

For us, Colchester really is a special place with amazing Roman archaeology everywhere and it was great to bring our Year 13 Ancient History course alive with this visit.



### Ballroom and Latin Dance

Congratulations to Sofia Szucsova in H9 who recently competed in the national 'Stars of the Future' Ballroom and Latin competition in London, coming first place in both the Ballroom and Latin categories for her age group, performing five different dances for each.

Sofia has been dancing for a total of nine years, currently attending Feathersteps Dance Academy, where she trains with two teachers, four times a week for up to 2 hours. Now that is commitment!

### DanceEast CAT Programme

In March, 25 students from Years 7-9 took part in four workshops led by Laura from DanceEast's Centre for Advance Training (CAT). DanceEast's CAT programme is one of nine centres in the country that offer training to talented young dancers from ages 10-18. As part of DanceEast's recruitment process for next academic year they ran several taster sessions in local schools. The workshops comprised of a technical warm-up allowing students to develop their own movement vocabulary, followed by a series of creative tasks that got them collaborating with their peers and producing some wonderfully colourful choreography!

The students clearly had an excellent time and some are now considering applying to Dance East's CAT as a result of their experience. Laura was really impressed with the students' talents but also their focussed and mature approach to the sessions, describing them as a 'delight' to work with.



### **National Youth Dance Competition**

In May, 20 students from Years 9-12 took part in a workshopled by Jena and Miriam from the National Youth Dance Company (NYDC). NYDC is England's Flagship youth dance organisation. They bring together talented young dancers from across the country to work with leading artists and create world-class performances. They support young artists to realise their potential and gain an insight into the dance profession. After a technical warm-up, students were taught a section of repertoire from NYDC's performance last year. The choreography was complex, grounded and required students to embody a very intense performance quality that pushed them outside of their comfort zone.



Students were then placed into groups and asked to work choreographically to develop ideas they had been taught and had an opportunity to teach other material they had created, helping them develop their own leadership skills.

The workshop material was of huge benefit to students and will aid them in developing their own choreographic work as part of their GCSE and A Level Dance courses. Jena and Miriam were very impressed at how quickly students were able to learn the material and their openness to trying something different.

### University Of Suffolk Dance Workshop

In May students from Year 7 took part in a part in workshops led by Kaff and Katie from the University of Suffolk and Dance East's degree programme. The workshops comprised of an energetic warm-up allowing students to work on their technical skills (accompanied by some fantastic music that got the students pumped!) followed by learning a short motif in a contemporary style. Students were then placed into groups and asked to work choreographically to develop ideas they had been taught. It was great to see students exploring creatively and developing the essential skills they will need to be successful in dance on their journey through KHS. All pupils clearly had a wonderful experience and learnt some new moves to incorporate into their own choreography. Kaff and Katie were amazed by the students' talent and said they had underestimated how good students would be at this age – clearly, they have been trained well!

Along with our normal summer concert programme with ensemble and solo performances, there was an extra night in order to say farewell to Mr Woodley. Students from as far back as 1996 return to KHS to perform alongside current students. It led to a memorable and impressive evening of performance.








#### Forensic Psychology Day



23. E As the six angles at O are equal, each is  $360^\circ \div 6 = 60^\circ$ . The five angles at the centre of the regular pentagon formed by joining each of its vertices to O are also all equal. So  $\angle POT$  is  $360^\circ \div 5 = 72^\circ$ . Therefore  $\angle TOG = \angle POG - \angle POT = (2 \times 60 - 72)^\circ = 48^\circ$ . Consider triangle  $TOS : \angle TOS = 72^\circ$  and, as O is the centre of the pentagon, SO = TO. Hence  $\angle OTS = \angle OST = (180 - 72)^\circ \div 2 = 54^\circ$ . In triangle TOG,  $\angle TOG = 48^\circ$  and  $\angle OTG = \angle OTS = 54^\circ$ . So  $\angle TGO = (180 - 48 - 54)^\circ = 78^\circ$ .





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
