




Chemistry action




Youth Takeover Event



Arts Award

Run a marathon challenge

Jess Grant was a much-loved student who died of Osteosarcoma, a rare form of bone cancer, in January 2018 when she was in Year 11. Jess would have been in Year 13 now and this is why the Sixth Form Committee would like to raise money for her charity. Jess loved playing music and her charity provides music therapy to children who have long term illnesses or require additional emotional support.

The Sixth Form are setting a challenge to every student in the school to run a marathon over 12 weeks. This is a huge task, but one that is also achievable. Students will be asked to raise sponsorship for their marathon and the person who raises the most money will receive a £50 voucher of their choice.

The launch of the Run a Marathon Challenge is the Santa Run on Friday 18 December where they can start their journey to running 26 miles. We look forward to seeing lots of participants on this annual fun run, a much-enjoyed tradition of Kesgrave High School life. Further details of the challenge and sponsorship forms have been shared with all students on Firefly. We hope as many students as possible will get involved.

So far the committee has rasied £465 and are very much hoping that they can add to this through this challenge.






Immersive reading



Supporting FIND

Our Year 12 and 13 students have been thinking about others, as well as their studies, since returning to Kesgrave this term. As well as a huge pile underneath the Christmas tree, the students are pictured with boxes collected across the form groups, ready for donation to the local charity Families In Need. For the last 30 years, FIND Ipswich has offered a lifeline to people in Ipswich and the surrounding areas who are experiencing poverty and despair. They provide free food parcels and personal care items to help people get through a crisis, as well as furniture, bedding and other household items where the person or family has none. Students have brought donations and will be delivering their parcels to the depot before we break up.



Blankets from waste?

Following consideration of our own mental health in Personal Social Health and Emotional Education this term, we have been thinking about other people, and realised that it could be frighteningly easy for someone to end up homeless. This year, because of COVID we discovered that many hostels for the homeless haven't been open, making things even harder for them.

We saw a lady online who was in the news for making blankets out of crisp packets to give to homeless people and we decided that, with the amount of crisps that are eaten by students, we could give this a go. So we put messages in the school bulletin, and distributed boxes around the classrooms for all students to put their empty crisp packets into, and students from each year group went around all their forms collecting the packets. We then had a whole form task of cleaning and cutting the crisp packets; a big job! A group of us then laid strips of crisp packets together, and ironed them using a piece of baking paper so that the heat melted the packets and they stuck together. These strips were then ironed together. Next we had to lay the crisp packets within a double sheet of plastic, and again iron that on. The result is a large, flexible, waterproof blanket that also helps to keep heat in because of the foil layer on the crisp packets.

We managed to make four full-size blankets in a morning with all of us working together. These will be taken into Ipswich and given to the soup kitchen who will then hand them to those in need. This was not only a great form project, but something that the whole school was able to contribute to, and we felt a real sense of achievement at the end.
