The Psychology A level is structured into three units where we explore the main approaches in psychology, and how psychology can be applied.

- Develop an overall understanding of the main approaches to understanding behaviour
- Be able to connect theories and research to real life behaviours in order to understand causes of that behaviour
- Be aware of the debates in psychology, such as the nature/nurture debate
- Acquire a range of relevant psychology and generic skills, including description, application, evaluation, research and methodology skills, debate and extended writing
