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TRUSTEES' REPORT
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2019

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditors' report of the charitable company for the year 1 September 2018 to 31 August 2019. The annual report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' report and a directors' report under company law.

The trust operates an academy for pupils aged 11 to 19 serving a catchment area in east Ipswich and surrounding area. It has a pupil capacity of 1,900 and had a roll of 1,860 in the school census on 5 October 2019.

As described in more detail in the following pages, the operation of the school was transferred from the Trust on 1 September 2019. The following report refers to conditions in the financial year, except where otherwise stated.

Going Concern

Following an open and transparent consultation process, the Trustees of Kesgrave High School agreed to form a Multi-Academy Trust (MAT) with Farlingaye High School and Bungay High School. The East Anglian Schools Trust Ltd (EAST) will provide a resilient structure that seeks to guarantee the future of current and future students of Kesgrave High School. In addition to the financial benefits, as economies of scale and efficiencies will be driven back into student education, the opportunity to work more closely with other students at different schools on academic projects, sporting pursuits, enrichment activities and trips and clubs, the sharing of resources, facilities and activities, and the access to a wider range of skills, will deliver an enhanced standard of education.

The Board transferred Kesgrave High School, including all assets, liabilities and operations, to the EAST Multi Academy Trust on 1 September 2019, for £nil consideration. The Kesgrave High School Academy Trust will be dissolved once arrangements have been completed for the smooth wind-up of the company. For this reason, the financial statements for the period of 1 September 2018 to 31 August 2019 are prepared on the non-going concern basis. Further details are included in notes 1 and 27. All risks and uncertainties for the school will now be reflected in EAST Multi Academy Trust.

Structure, governance and management

a. Constitution

The academy is a charitable company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity.

The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing document of the Academy Trust.

The Trustees of Kesgrave High School are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law.

The charitable company is known as Kesgrave High School

Details of the Trustees who served during the year, and to the date these accounts are approved are included in the Reference and administrative details on page 1.

b. Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

c. Trustees' indemnities

The Academy has purchased insurance to cover Trustees and officers from claims arising from negligent acts, errors or omissions occurring while on Academy business. Details of the costs can be found in Note 12 to the accounts.

d. Method of recruitment and appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the company is the responsibility of the Trustees who are appointed under the terms of the Articles of Association.

Trustees are subject to retirement after a term of 4 years. After the term, they are eligible for re-election at the meeting at which they retire.

All new Trustees are given an initial briefing by the Chair, a tour of the Academy and the chance to meet with staff and students. All Trustees are provided with copies of policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, budgets, plans and other documents that they will need to undertake their role as Trustees, and further training also available to them.

e. Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

The training and induction provided for the new Trustees will depend on their existing experience. Where necessary, induction will provide training on charity and educational, legal and financial matters. As there are normally only two or three new Trustees a year, induction tends to be done informally and is tailored specifically to the individual. The Academy provides INSET training and buys into other training programs. A record of training is kept up to date by the Link Governor and Clerk.

f. Organisational structure

The management structure consists of three levels: the Trustees, Governing Body Committees and the Leadership Team.

The Trustees are responsible for setting general policy, adopting an annual plan and budget, monitoring the Academy Trust by the use of budgets, and making major decisions about the direction of the Academy, capital expenditure and senior staff appointments. Committees of the Governing Body have delegated responsibilities. Committees exist for Steering committee, Curriculum Standards and Staffing committee, Student and Community Committee, Finance Committee, Premises Committee, Hearings Committee, Appeals Committee, Pupil Discipline Committee, Admissions Committee and Audit Committee.

The Senior Leadership team consists of the Headteacher and 2 Deputy Headteachers. These managers control the Academy Trust at an executive level implementing the policies laid down by the Trustees and reporting back to them. The Headteacher is the Accounting Officer.

g. Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

The pay and remuneration of the key management team is reviewed and set by the Trustees' Pay Committee, following the performance management cycle. This is benchmarked to be consistent with national leadership pay scales, relating to the size of the Academy.

h. Connected organisations including related party relationships

Kesgrave High School operates with Farlingaye High School as a Teaching School, and a separate Company (Farlingaye Kesgrave Teaching Alliance) with its own auditing, governance and checking mechanisms has been set up to manage this relationship. The company was set up on 30 July 2012 and is a joint venture between Kesgrave High School and Farlingaye High School. This also transferred on 1 September 2019 to become part of EAST.

i. Trade union facility time

During the year:

- there were no employees who were relevant union officials during the 2018/19 financial year;
- there was no time spent on facility time during the 2018/19 financial year; and
- there was no time spent on paid trade union activities during the 2018/19 financial year

j. Risk Management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Academy is exposed, in particular those relating to the specific teaching, provision of facilities and other operational areas of the Academy and its finances. The Trustees have implemented a number of systems to assess risks that the school faces, especially in the operational areas (eg in relation to teaching, health and safety, bullying and school trips) and in relation to the control of finance. They have introduced systems, including operational procedures (eg vetting of new staff and visitors, supervision of school grounds) and internal financial controls (see below) in order to minimise risk. Where significant financial risk still remains, they have ensured that they have adequate insurance cover. The Academy has an effective system of internal financial controls and this is explained in more detail in the following statement.

The Trustees have considered the need for specific internal audit function and have decided not to appoint an internal auditor. However, the Trustees have appointed an external Responsible Officer (RO). The RO's role includes giving advice on financial matters and performing a range of checks on the Academy's financial systems. To assist with this role, Trustees have procured the Responsible Officer Support Service from Schools' Choice. On a quarterly basis, Schools' Choice undertake an independent review of the financial systems and provide a written report providing feedback on how the Academy's financial affairs are being discharged. The appointed RO Trustee then presents this report back to all Trustees. The report includes action points identifying any areas for improvement.

This provides the Governing Body with assurance that:

- the financial responsibilities of the Governing Body are being properly discharged;
- resources are being managed in an efficient, economical and effective manner;
- sound systems of internal financial control are being maintained; and
- financial considerations are fully taken into account in reaching decisions.

These arrangements can provide only reasonable and not absolute assurance that assets are safe guarded, transactions are authorised and properly recorded, and that material errors or irregularities are either prevented or would be detected within a timely period.

Objectives and activities

a. Objects and aims

We are proud to uphold our values as a Learning community, whereby we do our best to empower students and staff. Since the school opened in 1931, there has been a tradition of using active learning strategies and a sense of adventure and challenge in lessons, and extra-curricular activities. Kesgrave is the birthplace of the three period day, and the ninety-five minute sessions generate prime conditions for collaborative learning, the development of reflective thinking and high order learning skills. We have raised standards not by over-testing, but by nurturing the confidence of learners through formative assessment, learning dialogues and outstanding teaching. Mixed ability groupings are the norm in subjects across the school and skilful, innovative teaching strategies provide the foundation for impressive attainment and achievement. Youngsters are incredibly supportive of each other, confident in taking on the mantle of the expert to teach others. This mutually supportive culture can be seen in every aspect of school life.

We are keen to share good practice and to develop skills and innovation as part of our Teaching School status, having developed a sustainable Teaching School Alliance with over 18 member schools.

b. Objectives, strategies and activities

To advance for the public benefit education in the United Kingdom by carrying on, managing and developing a school offering a broad and balance curriculum. To promote for the benefit of the inhabitants of Ipswich and the surrounding area the provision of facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation

- To implement our plan as a Teaching School in collaboration with Farlingaye High School, to ensure that we build a strong Alliance of mutually supportive schools.
- To manage the new Astro turf facility to ensure positive community and school use.
- To strengthen our CPD programme.
- To develop stronger partnerships with other schools and academies.
- To raise achievement levels for students across the ability spectrum.
- To set up a Multi-Academy Trust with Bungay and Farlingaye High Schools.

c. Public benefit

The school provides a wide range of extra-curricular activities for all its students at lunchtime and after school. Many activities, such as the successful and oversubscribed Duke of Edinburgh scheme, take place at weekends. We also have regular usage of our sports and creative arts facilities by a wide range of community groups. The school caters for over 1,860 students at a level Ofsted describes as good. The Academy has complied with the duties in its remit to provide a comprehensive education for all its students, together with providing significant public benefit in terms of extra-curricular activities and community use of the school's facilities.

The charitable company's aims are set out in this report. The Trustees have complied with their duty under Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission and the Trustees have paid due regard to this guidance in deciding what activities the charitable company should undertake.

Strategic report

Achievements and performance

a. Key performance indicators

Kesgrave High School converted to academy status on 1 August 2011 and was a school rated 'Outstanding' by Ofsted in November 2008. The school has now been rated 'Good' after inspection by Ofsted in September 2013 and November 2018, with Outstanding Behaviour, Sixth Form performance and Special Educational Needs provision.

The total number of students on role in the year ended 31 August 2019 numbered 1,860. From 1 September 2018, the Academy has a PAN (Pupil Admissions Number) of 308 in all year groups.

b. Achievements and performance

- The Teaching School had a very busy and vibrant eighth year, successfully achieving all its targets.
- Designated and operating as a centre of excellence for Computing.

c. Examination Results 2019

- At Key Stage 4, 80% of students achieved 4-9 grades in English and 71% of students achieved 4-9 grades in Maths at GCSE.
- At A Level, our results are in line with expectations. 65% achieved grades A*-C.

Financial review

a. Reserves policy

The school is only able to maintain a small reserve at present, to ensure we cover maintenance costs which arise, particularly in the 1930's section of the school.

During the year the free reserves policy was to retain one month of expenditure equating to approximately £850,000.

Due to the transfer of trade on 1 September and intention to wind up the company there is not currently a formal reserves policy.

Free reserves stood at £527,567 (2018 - £417,931) at the year end. This includes £75,936 (2018 - £64,386) of funds designated towards replacement of the Artificial Grass Pitch. The Academy also had £54,116 (2018 - £67,425) of funding which had been restricted for various education activities.

The pension reserve is in deficit due to the Academy's share of the LGPS liabilities exceeding its share of the assets

b. Investment policy

The Trustees consider the most appropriate policy is for the surplus funds to be held on bank deposit, although we have adopted an Investment Policy should our Reserves position improve.

c. Principal risks and uncertainties

The key risks facing the Academy relate to the uncertain financial outlook, with unpredictability over income, which is at best stable, whilst expenditure costs are continuing to rise. There are problems in planning for future growth due to the lack of available capital funding. EAST will continue to bid for capital funding.

d. Financial risk management objectives and policies

The Trustees have undertaken a review of the major risks the Academy faces and are confident that adequate controls are in place to mitigate those risks. The Trustees see a large value in the risk review process and are setting up systems to develop this over the next period.

Financial review (continued)

e. Overview

Most of the Academy's income is obtained from the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) in the form of recurrent grants, the use of which is restricted to particular purposes. These grants received from the ESFA during the period ended 31 August 2019 and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the statement of financial activities.

The Academy has also been in receipt of capital grants from the ESFA through the bid process for Capital Maintenance Fund. In accordance with the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice, 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP FRS 102), such grants are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities as restricted income in the fixed asset fund. The restricted fixed asset fund balance is reduced by annual depreciation charges over the expected useful life of the assets concerned.

During the year ended 31 August 2019, total expenditure of £9,613,335 (excluding restricted fixed asset funds) was more than covered by recurrent grant funding from the EFA together with other incoming resources. The excess of income over expenditure for the year (excluding restricted fixed asset and pension funds, ie the unrestricted and general restricted funds) was £118,513.

At 31 August 2019, the net book value of fixed assets was £15,944,491 and movements in tangible fixed assets are shown in the note 13 to the financial statements. The assets were used exclusively for providing education and the associated support services to the pupils of the Academy.

In accordance with FRS102, the Academy received an actuarial assessment of pension scheme deficit. The deficit balance is included within the balance sheet as at 31 August 2019 and supporting notes to the accounts (see note 22)

Fundraising

The fundraising activities undertaken by the school include non-uniform days and occasional cake sales. Proceeds from these are donated to charities chosen by the students. We do not work with any professional fundraisers and we have received no complaints.

Plans for future period

The academy trust ceased to operate when it joined the EAST Multi Academy Trust on 1 September 2019. Following the transfer the company has been dormant and has no assets or liabilities. It is the trustees' intention to wind up the company.

Disclosure of information to auditors

Insofar as the Trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware, and
- that Trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information.

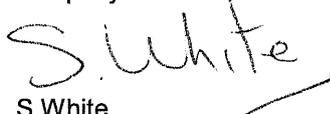

Scope of responsibility

As Trustees, we acknowledge we have overall responsibility for ensuring that Kesgrave High School has an effective and appropriate system of control, financial and otherwise. Review of value for money

The purpose of the system of internal control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can, therefore, only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of academy policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in Kesgrave High School for the year 1 September 2018 to 31 August 2019 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Capacity to handle risk

The board of Trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the academy is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The board of Trustees is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy's significant risks that has been in place for the year 1 September 2018 to 31 August 2019 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of Trustees.

The risk and control framework

The Academy Trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures, including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of Trustees;
- regular reviews by the Finance Committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines.
- delegation of authority and segregation of duties;
- identification and management of risks.

The board of Trustees has considered the need for a specific internal audit function and has decided not to appoint an internal auditor. However, the Trustees have appointed Schools Choice as an external responsible officer (RO).

The Responsible Officer's role includes giving advice on financial matters and performing a range of checks on the Academy's financial systems. On a quarterly basis, the Responsible Officer reports to the board of Trustees on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the board of Trustees' financial responsibilities.

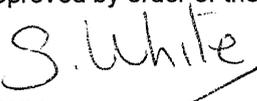
Review of effectiveness

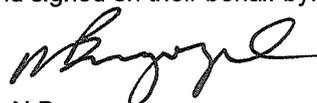
As accounting officer, the Head Teacher has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

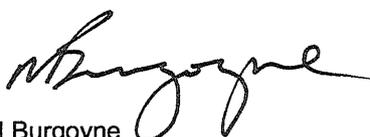
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STATEMENT ON REGULARITY, PROPRIETY AND COMPLIANCE

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STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2019

The Trustees (who are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with the Academies Accounts Direction published by the Education & Skills Funding Agency, United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) and applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under company law the Trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for that period. 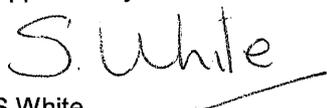

Opinion

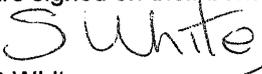

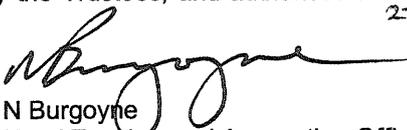

1. Accounting policies

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements of the academy, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historic cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2018 to 2019 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

Kesgrave High School meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

1.2 Going concern

As described in note 27, all assets, liabilities and operations of the Trust were transferred to the EAST Multi Academy Trust for £nil consideration on 1 September 2019 and the Kesgrave High School Academy Trust ceased to operate. Following the completion of the transfer, the Trustees intend to dissolve the company. For this reason, the financial statements have been prepared on a basis other than going concern. No material accounting adjustments have arisen as a result of ceasing to apply the going concern basis.

1.3 Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the academy has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

• **Grants**

Grants are included in the Statement of financial activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the Balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of financial activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the year is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the Balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

• **Donations**

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

• **Other income**

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the year it is receivable and to the extent the academy has provided the goods or services.

1.3 Income (continued)

Academy trip income and expenditure is classified as unrestricted.

1.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

• **Charitable activities**

These are costs incurred on the academy's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the academy apportioned to charitable activities.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

1.5 Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding requiring the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of financial activities and carried forward in the Balance sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of financial activities. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land and assets under construction, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life.

1.5 Tangible fixed assets (continued)

Depreciation is provided on the following bases:

Long leasehold	- Over the life of the lease
Furniture and fixtures	- 10 years straight line
Computer equipment	- 3 years straight line
Motor vehicles	- 3 years straight line

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of financial activities.

1.6 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the academy; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

1.7 Joint venture

The Academy Trust holds 50% of the ordinary shares of Farlingaye Kesgrave Teaching Alliance, a company registered in England and Wales.

This joint venture is recognised using the cost model, and this joint venture is a company limited by guarantee. As such, there is no cost to recognise, and therefore the requirements under FRS 102 are satisfied by disclosure in the notes to the financial statements.

A summary of the results of the Farlingaye Kesgrave Teaching Alliance for the year ended 31 August 2019 is shown in note 25.

1.8 Operating leases

Rentals under operating leases are charged to the Statement of financial activities incorporating income and expenditure account on a straight line basis over the lease term.

1.9 Taxation

The academy is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the academy is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Part 11, chapter 3 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

1.10 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities and provisions are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

1.11 Financial instruments

The academy only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy and their measurement bases are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 14. Prepayments are not financial instruments. Amounts due to the academy's wholly owned subsidiary are held at face value less any impairment. Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 15. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

1.12 Pensions

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ("TPS") and the Local Governments Pension Scheme ("LGPS"). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. As stated in note 22 the TPS is a multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each Balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of financial activities incorporating income and

1.13 Fund Accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the academy at the discretion of the Trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by the funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Department for Education Group.

1.14 Agency arrangements

The academy trust acts as an agent in distributing 16-19 bursary funds from ESFA. Payments are received from ESFA and subsequent disbursements to students are excluded from the statement of financial activities as the trust does not have control over the charitable application of the funds. The trust can use up to 5% of the allocation towards its own administration costs and this is recognised in the statement of financial activities. The funds received and paid and any balances held are disclosed in note 25.

The Academy acts as agent for funding received on behalf of FKTA – Farlingaye Kesgrave Teaching Alliance. A summary of transactions in the year have been disclosed in note 25.

2. Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgment

Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions:

The academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost or income for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 22, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2016 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2019. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

22. Pension commitments

The academy's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme for England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by Suffolk County Council. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2012 and of the LGPS 31 March 2016.

Contributions amounting to £31,356 were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2019 (2018 - £31,093) and are included within creditors.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for full-time teachers in academies and, from 1 January 2007, automatic for teachers in part-time employment following appointment or a change of contract, although they are able to opt out.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and members contribute on a 'pay as you go' basis - these contributions along with those made by employers are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2012 and in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 9 June 2014. The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 16.48% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% employer administration charge)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £191,500 million, and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £176,600 million giving a notional past service deficit of £14,900 million
- an employer cost cap of 10.9% of pensionable pay will be applied to future valuations

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22. Pension commitments (continued)

- the assumed real rate of return is 3.0% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.75%. The assumed nominal rate of return is 5.06%.

The TPS valuation for 2012 determined an employer rate of 16.4%, which was payable from September 2015. The next valuation of the TPS is currently underway based on April 2016 data, whereupon the employer contribution rate is expected to be reassessed and will be payable from 1 September 2019.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the year amounted to £409,814 (2018 - £431,500).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the [Teachers' Pensions website](#).

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local Government Pension Scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the year ended 31 August 2019 was £363,000 (2018 - £352,000), of which employer's contributions totalled £296,000 (2018 - £284,000) and employees' contributions totalled £67,000 (2018 - £68,000). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 26 per cent for employers and 6 per cent for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.

For sensitivity purposes the Actuary has advised that they estimate that a one year increase in life expectancy would approximately increase the Employer's Defined Benefit Obligation by 3-5%, but that in practice the actual cost would depend on the structure of the revised assumption. The table above discloses the monetary impact of a 4% change.

24. Related party transactions

Owing to the nature of the academy's operations and the composition of the board of trustees being drawn from local public and private sector organisations, transactions may take place with organisations in which a trustee has an interest. During the year the academy received income in respect of teacher training of £57,513 (2018 - £115,058) from Farlingaye Kesgrave Teaching Alliance (FKTA), a joint venture. The salary of the administrator of FKTA is an employee of Kesgrave High School and her salary is recharged at cost.

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25. Joint venture

The Academy Trust is a joint member with 50% control over Farlingaye Kesgrave Teaching Alliance, a company limited by guarantee and registered in England and Wales (company number 08160407). The other member of the company is Farlingaye High School.

Both Kesgrave High School and Farlingaye High School were designated as a joint Teaching School in July 2011. As a result, they formed the Farlingaye Kesgrave Teaching Alliance to strive to continually improve the quality of teaching, learning and standards for students locally.

28. Agency arrangements

The academy trust distributes 16-19 bursary funds to students as an agent for ESFA. In the accounting period ending 31 August 2019, the trust received £19,418 (2018 - £21,330) and disbursed £12,113 (2018 - £13,319) from the fund. A cumulative amount of £32,788 (2018 - £25,483) is included in other creditors relating to undistributed funds that are repayable to ESFA.

The Academy acts as agent for funding received as part of the Maths Hub project. In the accounting period ending 31 August 2019 the trust received £200,461 (2018 - £330,552) and disbursed £345,891 (2018 - £203,116) from the fund. A cumulative amount of £nil (2018 - £280,222) is included in other creditors related to undistributed funds that are repayable.

Following Kesgrave High Schools withdrawal from the Maths Hub project, the remaining unspent fund balance of £134,792 has been included within income.

29. Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up while he/she is a member, or within one year after he/she ceases to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10 for the debts and liabilities contracted before he/she ceased to be a member.
